



Honoring those who served


Fort Harrison community volunteers gathered December 14 to honor all known veterans buried in the Dayton Cemetery. It was our second annual Wreaths Across America event.

The Board of Directors extends appreciation to all who attended the inspiring ceremony and those who contributed the wreaths placed on the graves of 193 veterans. The time period of service ranged from the French and Indian War (1754-1763), American Revolution, War of 1812, 1800s Militia, Civil War, Spanish American War, World War I, World War II, Korean War, Vietnam Conflict, and additional conflicts.

It is very appropriate that Fort Harrison sponsor this special day, as the land on which the Dayton Cemetery is located was once the property of Daniel Harrison, owner of Fort Harrison and one of the earliest settlers in this part of the Shenandoah Valley. As a militia captain during the French and Indian War, Daniel Harrison would have been one of the first veterans in our community. The oldest stone in the cemetery is that of Mary Harrison who died in 1794 at age 26. It is believed that Daniel Harrison and other family members are buried near her grave in the earliest section of the cemetery.

We also extend our special thanks to members of the Turner Ashby Brass Ensemble under the direction of Rob Nash, American Heritage Girls Troop 1199 for presentation and retirement of the flags, soloist Alyson Harmes accompanied by Aaron Looney, Melissa Harper of the Pence Middle School Music Department, and Elijah Disharoon for his playing of "Taps" at the conclusion of the wreath laying ceremony.

In Remembrance CHARLES W. WARREN

March 22, 1942 - November 1, 2019

Clyde Jenkins of Page County

Cultivating that old-fashioned flavor

In November, Fort Harrison sponsored an Apple Tasting Day. Mr. Clyde Jenkins of Page County, a long time cultivator of many heirloom apple varieties, was our presenter.

Clyde is carrying on his family's tradition of grafting heirloom apple saplings from his home orchard near Stanley, Virginia. At the "ripe" age of 10, Clyde began grafting a new variety of apple that would later become known as the Jenkins Apple.

During his demonstration, he shared many apple varieties for tasting, including the Albemarle Pippin, Ben Davis, Black Twig, Ashmead's Kernel, Ground's Golden, Haralson, and Arkansas Black, as well as a number of other varieties. In addition to tracing the history of each heirloom variety, Clyde explained his grafting techniques and why grafting is necessary to cultivate the exact apple characteristics. For example, he explained that grafting ensures that you get the variety you are looking for; planting seeds does not guarantee that result.

Participants at the tasting were invited to visit his orchard this coming spring, where they can learn grafting techniques and purchase grafting stock in many varieties.

As one of the very few heirloom apple tree growers in Virginia and with a vast knowledge of the topic, Clyde continues to provide us with an ever growing wealth of information. In addition to his skills as a white oak basket maker. Clyde also is a talented stone mason. He designed and built the stone chimney memorial in Stanley, which is part of the Blue Ridge Heritage Project, a grassroots effort to honor families displaced by the development of Shenandoah National Park.



Old varieties were grown for flavor, ability to hold over during winter months, and other characteristics. They weren't necessarily pretty. Apples retailed in grocery stores are typically developed for their
